

A host of local companies are started and run by ambitious, forward-thinking individuals. Some have grown yet continue to set the tone for innovation as they move forward.


Still other individuals work in the region's research centers, where they seek new health-care solutions, some of which are so cutting-edge they've been honored by the National Institutes of Health.

## 2. Duck Foot Brewing Co.

Matt DelVecchio, head quack

Craft beer makers are continually pushing the envelope. Everything from grapefruit



Imagine, though, if you had a physical condition that didn't allow you to partake. That was Matt DelVecchio's dilemma. He has celiac disease. People who have it are very sensitive to gluten. And beer has lots of it.

He did not cry into his beer, though. He made his own, with an enzyme that removes much of the gluten from the beer. It

may allow people who are sensitive to gluten to enjoy a nice cold craft beer. DelVecchio is proof it can be done. He drinks his own product.

However, DelVechhio has made it clear that he doesn't want his beer to be judged any differently than other craft beers. He thinks it happens to rock.
